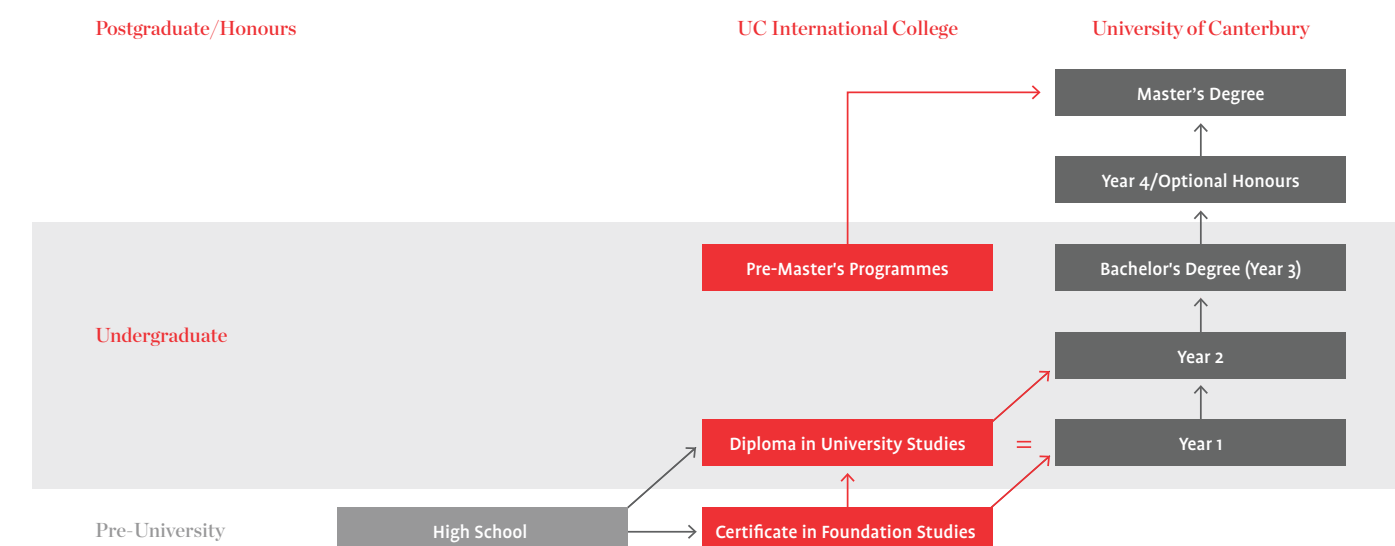

Certificate in Foundation Studies

The Certificate in Foundation Studies is equivalent to the final year of secondary school study and is designed to bridge the gap between high school and university entrance. In the Foundation Programme students complete a set of core courses, a numeracy elective and three courses from an area of focus (Arts, Commerce, Engineering, and Science).

The course **Global Intercultural Citizenship** develops students' understanding of the key concepts of cultural identity and cultural diversity, with an emphasis on the unique local bicultural context of Aotearoa New Zealand and explores strategies for promoting intercultural empathy and collaboration at a global level.

The course **Sustainable Citizenship** introduces students to the principles of sustainable development and develops analytical skills required to assess the impact of human activities both locally and globally.

Students choose from other elective courses including Media & Communications, Psychology, Sociology, Information Design, Economics, Accounting, Management & Marketing, Chemistry, Physics, Statistics, Biology & Programming.

Study Abroad Certificate

The Study Abroad Certificate is a one-semester programme designed to give students a taste of what student life is like at UC International College. Students can choose three academic courses from one stream while experiencing the best of what New Zealand has to offer.

If you want the chance to study in beautiful New Zealand and are looking to diversify your current study plan during a gap trimester, then UCIC's Study Abroad Programme may be for you.

Study Abroad is a one semester programme designed to allow students to improve their English language skills while undertaking three academic subjects and credit their courses to future study at home or in New Zealand.

Diploma in University Studies

The Diploma in University Studies comprises eight courses and is completed in three trimesters spanning 12 months of study. Students are able to complete their Diploma in one of three areas of specialisation - Commerce, Engineering or Science – before completing the final years of a range of bachelor’s degrees and subject majors at UC.

DipUS – Commerce

A degree in commerce gives you the knowledge and skills to succeed in the global business environment. Students studying commerce at UCIC complete core courses in Accounting, Economics, Management, Statistics, and Information Systems, as well as a range of electives to ensure students are able to choose from the entire array of majors in the Bachelor of Commerce.

DipUS – Science

Studying science helps students understand the world through observation, experimentation, modelling and calculation. At UCIC we focus on developing students' skills and abilities in computational science that allow them to progress into subject areas such as Computer Science, Financial Engineering, Mathematics, and Statistics. Our students are also able to pathway into the Bachelor of Data Science.

DipUS – Engineering

Engineering is a four-year degree that provides students the opportunity to pursue one of eight disciplines in their final three professional years of study. University of Canterbury engineering graduates can work as qualified engineers all over the world. In their first year at UCIC, students build a foundation of knowledge in Engineering Processes, Mathematics, Physics, and Computer Science.

International Baccalaureate	Completion of at least 18 points across six (6) subjects
Cambridge International Examinations	Passing grades in at least two A or AS level academic subjects with at least 3 points overall
New Zealand - NCEA	Completion of a minimum of 10 credits in each of three UE approved subjects at Level 3

What Bachelor’s degrees can you do at UC?

After completing Diploma Programmes, students will transition into their 2nd year at the University of Canterbury. Students can choose from a wide selection of majors in the Bachelor of Commerce, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Engineering, and Bachelor of Data Science, which will help them achieve their dream career.

While studying at UCIC, students also get in-study work rights, allowing them to work up to 25 hours per week.

Pre-Master’s Programmes

The Pre-Master’s Programme offers a pathway into postgraduate study for international students who don’t meet prior study requirements, increasing access to master’s degree programmes in Business, Engineering, Science, Health, Education, and Arts.

One Semester Pre-Master’s

The UCIC-taught One Semester Pre-Master’s Programme provides an accelerated pathway into postgraduate study for international students who hold a bachelor’s degree but do not meet entry requirements. Upon completion of the Pre-Master’s programme, you will be able to enter a range of master’s degrees across Business, Engineering, Science, Health, Education, and Art disciplines.

The pathway comprises one semester of coursework that prepares you generally for postgraduate study at UC, including courses that develop skills and knowledge in cultural and bi-cultural awareness, communication, critical thinking, and data analysis.

To enter the One Semester Pre-Master’s Programme you must hold a **bachelor’s degree** and meet our English language entry requirements.

Christchurch College of English (CCEL)

CCEL is a highly rated English language school in New Zealand, located on the beautiful University of Canterbury campus in Christchurch. CCEL offers English for Academic Purposes (EAP) courses to help students achieve their goals of university study through enhancing their academic English skills. Upon successful completion of 12-week EAP 1 Programme, students can gain direct entry (without an external exam) to CCEL’s partner institutions, UC International College and the University of Canterbury.



Accommodation

UC Halls of Residence
Fun and lively catered and self-catered options for First Year students. Private single bedrooms with study area, access to university Wi-Fi network, and social programmes. The distance to school is a five minute walk from the main library and lecture halls.

Homestay
Live with a New Zealand family and have your meals provided. Included: Three meals a day, fully furnished room with study desk, bathroom and laundry facilities, local telephone calls and internet. Distance to school varies, but will be within walking distance or accessible by public transport.

Private renting
Private renting with other people can be a very affordable way to live and study in Christchurch. The suburbs around UC provide excellent options for students. Distance to school varies, but will be within walking distance or accessible by public transport.
